In what ways have you experienced the transforming power of the Gospel in your life?

The sermon suggests that the Gospel's power is "true whether God changes your circumstances or not." How do we maintain faith and find peace in God's power when our circumstances don't change?

Peter specifically invokes "the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob" when explaining Jesus's identity (v. 13). Why do you think connecting Jesus to the Old Testament promises made to the patriarchs so important for Peter's audience? What relevance does this have for us today?

The sermon discusses how the people chose Barabbas (a murderer) over Jesus (the "Author of Life" v. 15). What are some modern examples of how we might choose "death over life" in our daily decisions?

Christians ought to model a life of repentance. What does that look like for you both privately and publicly?

Peter says that Jesus "blotted out" your sins when He died (v. 19). How does that affect your understanding of how God sees you? How does that affect the life of transformed obedience God is asking you to live?

How does the concept of Jesus returning to "restore all things" influence how we view and engage with current world problems and suffering?

The text emphasizes that God's covenant promises through Abraham extend to "all families of the earth" (v. 25). How might this universal scope of God's blessing challenge our own biases or limited vision of who belongs in God's family?
