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Other Passages: Acts 2:42-47,1 Chronicles 29:14, Deuteronomy 8:17-18 Read Acts 4:32-5:11

What area of your life do you find most difficult to view through the lens of stewardship rather than ownership? (Your time, money, home, skills, etc.)

Deuteronomy 8:17-18 warns against believing "my power has gotten me this wealth." Where in your life are you most tempted to take credit for what God has provided?

The sermon mentioned "27 million self-storage units in America." What does our culture of accumulation reveal about our hearts, and how might God be calling you to think differently about your possessions?

The text shows people laying gifts "at the apostles' feet" in a public manner. How do you balance Jesus' teaching about giving in secret (Matthew 6:3-4) with the public nature of generosity in Acts?

Acts 4:32 says "no one claimed that any of their possessions was their own." This doesn't mean they surrendered legal ownership, but rather adopted a mindset of availability. What practical steps could our small group take to cultivate this kind of "what's mine is available to you" attitude without necessarily selling everything we own?

Why is it so tempting to want to maintain a reputation that doesn't match reality?

The sermon noted that "Those who had needs had to be honest about their vulnerability." What makes it difficult for you to ask for help from your church family?

The judgment on Ananias and Sapphira seems severe to modern readers, but what does this dramatic response tell us about God's concern for the integrity of the early church?

Jesus said he came for "the sick, the broken... those who are worn out." How does acknowledging your brokenness actually position you to receive more of what Jesus offers?
